PRINCIPAL'S WELCOME

As Principal of Blackwater Integrated College, I am delighted you have taken the time to read our College Prospectus. I believe that Blackwater Integrated College truly offers an education that caters for students of all academic abilities. This is a very exciting time for the College and as we continue to go from strength to strength we remember our school motto of Building, Inspiring, Caring.

Building for the future:

As an integrated College we are very proud of the fact that we accept students from the two main religions of Catholic and Protestant in Northern Ireland as well as other religions and none. Integration to us means respecting yourself and others, even when they have different beliefs from yours. Blackwater is statistically one of the most diverse colleges in NI with a representative balance of the community in our intake.

With a proposal approved by the Department of Education in 2023 we are working with Mid Down Integrated College Steering group to form a new Integrated Post Primary school. The new College is set to open in September 2027 and any students enrolled in Blackwater IC will transfer across to the new College and have access to an 11-18 education in an integrated setting which is an exciting opportunity for all of our students and staff. An interim Board of Governors has been established and they are working with the Department of Education to establish the new school on a new site.



Inspiring success:

Our accelerated learning groups are aimed at students who are more academically able, so they can be encouraged to progress with both stimulation and pace. The intention is to make sure that they are happy, that they are stretched and that they fulfil their potential. Our current Year 8 accelerated group consists of many students who narrowly missed out on grammar school places and I am very confident that the environment we provide will allow those students to excel in their studies through to Post 16 provision.

We are very proud of the fact that we cater for the needs of all of our students. From September 2025 we have had Specialist Provision in place for students from Year 8 - Year 12 building on the excellent reputation the College has for working with students who have Special Educational Needs.

Caring for all:

Children will naturally achieve more and be successful if they are happy in their studies. Our pastoral team, from form tutors to Head of Junior and Senior School to Pastoral Coordinator, provides an environment and structures that allow students to be safe, very well cared for and happy. Small class sizes and the relationship developed with the form tutor allow each child to receive the care and attention they need to enable them to achieve their best throughout their time in the College. As an Integrated College parental involvement is very important.

WHY ATTEND AN INTEGRATED COLLEGE?

At Blackwater we are part of a strong group of an ever-increasing number of Integrated schools bringing together children and adults from Catholic, Protestant and other backgrounds in each school. We have a religious balance of pupils, teachers and governors and acknowledge and respect the cultural diversity they represent.

Blackwater aims to educate children in an environment where self-esteem and independence are developed as priorities. Self-respect and respect for others are strongly encouraged. The integrated ethos is nurtured to ensure inclusion of people from different religions, cultures, genders, abilities and socio-economic backgrounds. Our integrated ethos at Blackwater is very clear to see on any visit to the College and we work closely with Northern Ireland Council for Integrated Education (NICIE) and Integrated Education Fund (IEF) to facilitate this.

We were recognised recently for our pastoral work and in particular were nominated for Families First Award for Best Post Primary School (County Down), and Teacher of the Year (County Down) was Mrs Joy Millington. We are very proud of these nominations which came from parents.

We were also proud to accept an Investors in Mental Health Award from Aware NI. This award recognises the positive contribution that the college makes in supporting the mental health and well-being of all students on a daily basis.

Mid Down Integrated College Steering Group

In April 2019 a group of parents with children at Integrated Primary and Post Primary schools came together with the purpose of increasing the provision of integrated education in the local area. As a group they worked closely with the Northern Ireland Council for Integrated Education and the Integrated Education Fund to establish a new 11-18 integrated school in the Mid Down area. Mid Down Integrated College Steering Group worked with Blackwater Integrated College to do this and in October 2023 our plans (Development Proposals 667 & 668) were approved by the Department of Education.

The new College hopes to open in September 2027, and with Blackwater IC, Mid Down Integrated College Steering Group will work to turn this proposal into a reality, working alongside the Department of Education. All students enrolled in Blackwater at this date will automatically transfer across to the new 11-18 College College as stated in the proposal.

This will allow Blackwater students to avail of Post 16 Provision from September 2027 onwards and any student starting in Blackwater in September 2026 will automatically transfer into the new school and also have the opportunity of an 11-18 education in an integrated setting.

This is a very exciting time for the College and we look forward with great enthusiasm to what the future holds for our current and future students.



PASTORAL CARE



Settling in:

At Blackwater Integrated College, we understand that it can be quite difficult for young people to make the change from primary to post-primary education so care is taken to ensure that the transition goes as smoothly as possible. A structured induction programme is in place to enable students to settle quickly and feel part of the College.

As part of the induction programme for our new intake we have organised a summer scheme during the week before school starts in August 2026. This will be organised by our Youth Worker, Gary Boyd, who will work on an induction programme with new Year 8 students to familiarise them with the College. The first day of term in 2026 will also be set aside for Year 8 only. This allows the children to settle and form relationships with their teachers and peers; they will spend lots of time exploring their new surroundings. The induction process will continue through the early weeks of your child's time at the College within our Personal Development programme.

During the first term you will be invited to the College to meet with your child's subject teachers and form tutor. This will be an opportunity for you to find out how well your child has settled into the College and to discuss any concerns you might have.

How we support our students:

We place great emphasis on the pastoral care of our students. The basic pastoral unit is the tutor group, which consists of approximately 20 students. A tutor is assigned to each class and usually remains with the group as they move through the College.

Tutor groups meet each morning before class for registration and announcements. These tutorials ensure that a student who may be worried about any aspect of College life has daily access to his or her tutor who works closely with all staff to monitor each student's academic performance and personal development.

Tutor groups also follow a Preventative Curriculum during which students cover a wide range of relevant issues. Our pastoral system is a caring system that aims to put the children at ease right from the first day, free from worries and concerns, allowing them to feel safe and secure in their environment and to grow in confidence. There is also a real focus on promoting positive behaviour throughout all year groups.

We also have a permanent Youth Worker, Gary Boyd, in the College to support our students daily in a range of ways.

Pastoral policies for Anti-Bullying, Positive Behaviour, Child Protection, Attendance, and Digital Media are available on request from the College office.

IN SCHOOL PROVISION YOUTH WORKER

My name is Gary Boyd and I have the privilege of being the Youth Worker at BIC when I'm not wrestling with or playing personal waiter to my 3 boys. I have a wonderful wife Anna who keeps all us boys in line and makes sure we shower every day. My interests are quite varied from obsessing over Man City football club (someone has to), to geeking out with retro gaming, anime and cars. I'm from the generation that had to negotiate between using the phone or the internet in tandem and from a time when 10p crisps were 10p.

I have always dreamed of having a youth work role within a school environment after having spent 18 years as a youth worker in community and church settings. I had regularly delivered youth work sessions and experiences in multiple schools over that time working through issues of diversity, mental health and citizenship to name but a few. The key to great youth work for me is grounded in having significant and trusting relationships with the young people where they hold the power to invite you into their lives to invest in their personal and social, emotional development.

My role can be incredibly varied and often reactive to whatever situation or issue may arise on any particular day. Currently I work in one-to-one sessions and small group settings to help our students discover more about who they are, where they are going and how they can get there. In a nutshell it's all about identity. To get there however I journey alongside them through the highs and lows of life, the setbacks and celebrations and the wins and the losses to support them in becoming everything they can be and to reach their full potential.



For my entire career it has always been so important to recognise the importance of bringing everyone along on the journey when it comes to navigating teenagers through these key developmental years which is why I also extend any support to the families connected with Blackwater. This can include home visits to help parents and carers talk through the tough issues with teenagers and can also include assisting families in the tools they need to make better connections through understanding current trends in youth culture among other things.

Alongside all of that I work with external organisations and build partnerships with local services to bring them into our school to further build upon the pastoral work we provide as a school in support of our pupils. We've built some fantastic partnerships in recent years and had incredible and engaging organisations in the College looking at supporting mental health, encouraging participation and raising awareness of cultural diversity.

Although my role does not teach anything in the traditional classroom setting my hope is that it prepares young people to fully participate in society, accept and understand anyone who they may consider to be the other, support their emotional development and well-being and encourage an unwavering set of positive values

Finally, I hope I can develop this role further to support our students' lives in and beyond the school gates and help them all to be well-rounded, contributing members within their school, family and communities.

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The curriculum in Blackwater Integrated College is delivered by subject specialist teachers who regularly update their knowledge and skills through training and sharing of practice.

Blackwater Integrated College offers an accelerated learning class in each year at Key Stage 3, enabling students to access a tailored curriculum and this has enhanced outcomes for all at Key Stage 4. The most recent ETi inspection confirmed that "The outcomes attained by the pupils in most of the subjects at GCSE grades A* to C are in line with, or above, the corresponding NI subject averages".

As the College has developed and the range of both academic and vocational subjects has expanded at Key Stage 4 there has been a rise in standards: the majority of those following the Vocational Programme now achieve five or more GCSEs or equivalent qualifications. ETI confirmed that "pupils attain good standards in a wide range of vocational subjects".

Excellent pastoral systems support the students in their learning, and guidance on how to study effectively is delivered in the Personal Development programme and supplemented by enjoyable practical workshops at appropriate times.

Progress is tracked throughout a student's time at the College: targets are shared and students have access to further interventions as required.

With the new College opening in September 2027 all students entering Year 8 in September 2026 will have the opportunity to progress through to sixth form provision and access 'A' level courses and Level 3 courses without having to move school.

Online Learning

The College has recently invested in developing e-learning and is now well equipped with Chromebooks for all students. These are available for use in lessons, and some homework is also set on Google Classroom. All students are trained in how to use this and are developing confidence and competence in the wide range of ICT skills required for 21st century life and workplaces.

When students arrive in Year 8 they can lease a Chromebook for use in school and at home, and through Google Classroom students can access a range of resources both at home and in class. Recent surveys of parents and students have shown the use of Chromebooks to be a very popular addition to assist student learning at Blackwater IC.

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL AND ADDITIONAL NEEDS

Special Education is the education of students with special needs which may be learning, physical, social or emotional difficulties. Our policies are designed to ensure that all students, irrespective of ability, gender, race or social grouping, are enabled to work to their full potential. This was recognised in the last ETI inspection which stated "Over the past three years, the pupils who require additional support with aspects of their learning have attained well at GCSE (including equivalents)."

All students, including those identified as having special educational needs, experience a curriculum relevant to their needs and ability which fulfils the requirements of the Northern Ireland Curriculum while having regard to the Code of Practice.

We do this by:

- the early identification of SEN
- one-to-one or small group interventions by a support teacher
- actively involving parents
- maintaining a special educational needs register and record keeping system
- providing training for staff, including a team of teaching assistants
- liaising closely with appropriate services to support our young people, for example the ASD Advisory Service
- providing a complementary programme for students who need an alternative to the GCSE curriculum which enables them to achieve results equivalent to five or more GCSEs

Blackwater Integrated College provides support for students with Additional and Special Needs in accordance with SENDO legislation. Since September 2025 we have had Specialist Provision in place for students from Year 8 - Year 12 building on the excellent reputation the College has for working with students for Special Educational Needs.

The College supports the principle of inclusion of students with moderate learning difficulties within the student body and across a range of curriculum subjects. We have also added another new Sensory Room in the College and a programme to support its usage. FOR LIFE & WORK EDUCATION

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance in the college is very important for all students and is covered in a range of ways.

Careers Education and Learning for Life and Work complement each other to create a cohesive programme which meets the statutory requirement and provides the students with a realistic understanding of the world of employment.

Timetabled careers lessons introduce students to new concepts and give opportunities to explore new skills. The focus through Years 8 - 12 includes employment within the local and global economy, career planning, enterprise and entrepreneurship. In addition to this, Careers Education is incorporated into all other subjects across the curriculum.

To assist with subject choices in Year 10, students and their parents are invited to the College. This allows for discussion with staff which enables the students to make informed decisions about Key Stage 4 study. During Key Stage 4, students are made aware of post-16 options and are provided with impartial advice from the Careers Service. Moving forward from September 2027 Post 16 provision will be available at the new College and we will continue to work with students to provide them with the best pathway to meet their specific needs.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Blackwater Integrated College provides a Christian rather than a secular approach and context although students of all faiths and none are welcomed. The young people are nurtured in the values of their own ethnic, religious and cultural background and develop a respect for the different values of the other students.

Like any other school in Northern Ireland, Blackwater Integrated College has an obligation to deliver the statutory curriculum which, in the case of Religious Education, has been agreed by the main churches. Students also study world religions as part of the Religious Education programme as this broadens students' knowledge and understanding while encouraging tolerance and awareness of other religions and cultures in our community in line with our Integrated ethos.

Alternative arrangements can be made for students whose parents do not wish them to participate in Religious Education.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Board of Governors is comprised of up to 16 members. The Principal attends all Board meetings and many sub-committees in a non-voting capacity. The Board of Governors meets on a monthly basis.

Much of the College's business is handled by sub-committees, established to address various areas of policy. They meet as often as required and report back to the full Board of Governors. Any recommendations made by the Committees must be ratified by the full Board before they become policy.

Governors also attend meetings of groups which have close links with the school e.g. various meetings of the Northern Ireland Council for Integrated Education. All Governors are offered a programme of training to assist them in their role. The Board of Governors and the various constituencies of Foundation Governors, Department of Education Nominees, Parent Governors and Teacher Governors must be balanced in terms of religious tradition.

Respective functions of the Board of Governors and Principal in relation to admissions to the school

The Board of Governors draws up the admissions criteria and delegates to an Admissions Sub-Committee, which includes the Principal, the responsibility for applying these criteria. Any reference herein to the term the Board of Governors includes any Committee or Sub-Committee appointed by the Board of Governors for the purposes of applying the admissions criteria set out herein.

Admissions to Year 8 2026/27

During the admissions procedure when applying the criteria punctual applications will be considered before late applications are considered. The application procedure opens on 27 January 2026 at 12 noon (GMT) and an application submitted by the closing date of 19 February 2026 at 12 noon (GMT) will be treated as a punctual application. An application received after 12 noon (GMT) on 19 February 2026 will be treated as a late application.

The legal responsibilities under which the Board of Governors in the integrated sector have operated, were derived from the Education Reform (Northern Ireland) Order 1989. The Board of Governors of Blackwater Integrated College also acknowledge the introduction of the new Integrated Education Act 2022. Our aim is to achieve as even a balance as possible in the intake with regard to religious denomination, gender and academic ability. The College will reserve a maximum of 20% of places for students from 'other traditions'. 'Other traditions', for the purposes of these Admissions Criteria, is defined as tradition other than the Catholic or Protestant traditions. The criteria as set out below will first be applied to members of "other traditions"; the additional places will be allocated to the main tradition having the lesser number of applicants. The criteria set out below will be applied separately to Protestant and Roman Catholic applicants. In the event of there being fewer applicants from either tradition than there are places available for that tradition, the balance of places will be firstly available to the "other traditions" and secondly to the remaining tradition.

When considering which children should be selected for admission, the Board of Governors will take into account information supplied on the Transfer Application. The Board of Governors reserves the right to request such supplementary evidence as it may require in order to support or verify information on any applicant's Transfer Application. Parents should therefore ensure that all information pertaining to their child and relevant to the College's admissions criteria is stated on the Transfer Application or attached/uploaded to it.

In the event that there are more applicants than places available, the Board of Governors has determined that the following criteria shall be applied in the order set down:

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

1 - Siblings

Applicants who have a brother(s) or sister(s) or half-brother or half-sister enrolled in the College.

2 - Eldest Child

Applicants who are the first child in the family to transfer from primary education or, in the case of a family recently arrived in the area, the first to reach transfer age since arrival.

3 - Integration

Applicants who are transferring from a controlled integrated or a grant-maintained integrated primary school, as defined in the Education Reform Order (NI) 1989.

4 - Mixed Relationships

Applicants from a mixed relationship, which is here defined as one parent being Catholic and the other parent being Protestant or one parent being of any other religion outside the main traditions in Northern Ireland.

5 - Other Applicants

If following the application of the above criteria in order there comes a point where there are more pupils who meet a particular criterion than there are places then selection will be on the basis of initial letter of the surname in the order set out below:

U, J, R, C, D, V, G, Mc, A, M, Q, T, Y, H, Z, K, B, S, I, Mac, L, P, F, N, E, W, O, X

The order was determined by a randomised selection of letters and will be changed each year.

In the event of surnames beginning with the same initial letter the subsequent letters of the surnames will be used in alphabetical order. In the event of two identical surnames, the alphabetical order of the initials of the forenames will be used. If applicants are still tied after this, then priority will be determined amongst them by random selection on computer.

The religious affiliation of an applicant will be determined by reference to the following in the order given:

- 1 Information supplied on the Transfer Application.
- 2 The type of primary school which the pupil attended (i.e. controlled or maintained) will be used to determine the religious affiliation.
- 3 In the case of students transferring from an integrated primary school or the preparatory department of a voluntary grammar school, the school may be asked to supply such information as it can concerning the religious affiliation of the applicant.



ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

Duty to Verify

The Board of Governors reserves the right to require such supplementary evidence as it may determine to support or verify information on the Transfer Application.

Applicants should note that the provision of false or incorrect information or the failure to provide information within the deadlines set by post-primary schools can result in the withdrawal of a place and the inability to offer a place on the part of any school nominated on the applicant's Transfer Application.

Waiting List Policy

The criteria relating to the initial admission of students into Year 8 before the commencement of the 2026 academic year will also be used for entry into Year 8 should admission become possible after the commencement of the 2026 academic year.

Admission Criteria for Entry to Years 9 -12

Pupils will be considered for enrolment provided that:

- 1. Their admission will not cause the school to exceed its enrolment number;
- 2. Their admission will not cause the year group to exceed the admissions number set for it, at their time of entry.
- 3. In the opinion of the Board of Governors, their admission would not prejudice the efficient use of the school's resources.

Applications for admission during the school year will be considered as soon as possible after the application is received.
